3rd **Visit to the Old Bailey, London Silver Vaults, & Local Area** The London Silver Vaults is a large subterranean market that opened as The Chancery Lane Safe Deposit on 7 May 1885

10th **William Morris Gallery** Walthamstow. Museum devoted to the life and works of William Morris, an English Arts and Crafts designer and early socialist. It is located in Walthamstow at Water House, a substantial Grade II* listed Georgian home. The extensive grounds of the building are a public park, known as Lloyd Park.

17th **Burgh House & Hampstead Museum** Burgh House is a lovely Queen Anne manor built in 1704. It later became the property of Dr William Gibbons, a fashionable physician who encouraged visitors to Hampstead Wells Spa to drink the mineral waters for their health. It now houses a museum on the history of Hampstead and its fascinating people.

1st **Guildhall Art Gallery & London's Roman Amphitheatre** Guildhall Art Gallery was established in 1886. It contains works dating from 1670 to the present day: 17th century portraits, Pre-Raphaelite masterpieces and a fascinating range of paintings documenting London's dramatic history. You can also visit the ruins of an ancient Roman Amphitheatre, which was discovered by archaeologists in 1988 and now part of the gallery.

8th **Hogarth's House** Chiswick Hogarth's House contains an extensive collection of prints and engravings by the artist William Hogarth. The house was his country home and has been restored to tell the history of his life and the building.

15th **Golders Hill Park & Zoo** Technically part of Hampstead Heath, Golders Hill Park is a haven of beautifully designed gardens and pretty parkland. It features Mediterranean, water and walled gardens, a bandstand, a croquet lawn, tennis courts, table tennis tables and a children's play area. It's also a dream for animal-lovers thanks to its butterfly house, deer park and free zoo, which is home to ring-tailed lemurs, coatis, kookaburras and plenty of other interesting critters.



22nd **Valence House Museum & Gardens** Dagenham Only surviving manor house in Dagenham. It dates back to medieval times, is still partially surrounded by a moat and has a collection of nearly 30,000 items. Guardian voted it as one of the 50 best free things to do in London!. As well as exploring the museum, you can unwind in their tranquil gardens which include a herb garden and a World War Two 'Dig for Victory' garden.

29th **Boston Manor House and Gardens** Brentford Boston Manor House is a Grade II* listed Jacobean manor house located in Brentford, West London. It is believed to have been built in the early 17th century, and it is one of the few surviving Jacobean manor houses in the city.

5th **National Army Museum** Chelsea The National Army Museum (NAM) is the leading authority on the history of the British Army. It gathers, maintains and makes known the story of the British Army and its role and impact in world history.



12th **RAF Museum** Colindale The Royal Air Force Museum London is located on the former Hendon Aerodrome, in North London's Borough of Barnet. It includes five buildings and hangars showing the history of aviation and the Royal Air Force

19th **London Mithraeum - Roman Temple of Mithras** London EC4 The London Mithraeum, also known as the Temple of Mithras, Walbrook, is a Roman Mithraeum that was discovered in Walbrook, a street in the City of London, during a building's construction in 1954. The entire site was relocated to permit continued construction and this temple of the mystery god Mithras became perhaps the most famous 20th-century Roman discovery in London.

26th **Museum of Freemasonry** Collections composed of masonic ceremonial objects, jewellery, regalia, ceramics, glassware, silverware, clocks, furniture, books, prints and manuscripts relating to English freemasonry and its interactions with overseas lodges and orders
